Salim gives UAE gold

By Our Sports Reporter DUBAI - Salim Abdullah Salim presented hosts UAE with their first major victory on the final day of the second Arab youth cycling championship in Ras Al Khaimah on Thursday

Salim outsprinted his rivals to clinch the 98.4km individual road race for men held from behind KFC to Lafa Sahila area and back.

And in the women's category of 25km, Bal Madani Houda of Algeria timed 41mins 31secs to take the top spot at an average speed of 36.5km per hour.

A. Nasreen of Algeria was the runner-up in 41mins 57secs with Rajah Warda of Syria, third after she clocked 47mins 57secs.

Daliah Hussain of Egypt, who finished fourth unlucky as she led for the most part of the race. But she lost the lead about a kilometre from the finish line following a pile-up for

clinch victory.

It was a very close race in the men's division which comprised 48 cyclists from nine countries.

Five riders including salim broke away after the half-way mark taking a 2km lead. But with 500 metres to the finish, Salim powered his way to victory with a late sprint. Salim timed 2hrs

Houda to storm in front to 22mins 39secs at an average speed of 40km per hour, followed in second place by Hassan Ahmed Ibrahim of Bahrain, clocking the same

Third place went to Amru Mohammed Ahmed Egypt, who clocked the same time.

Shaikh Faisal bin Humaid Al Qasimi, president UAE Cycling Association,

expressed delight with Salim's effort on the last day of the championship.

He said Salim's victory was an inspiration to young cyclists in the country.

Shaikh Faisal, who is also the president of the Arab Cycling Federation, and other officials, later distributed prizes to the winners.

Kerhoeven stars in kitesurfing

DUBAI - Dubai-based German kitesurfer Bernd Kerhoeven joined world champion Charles Deleau on the victory podium yes-terday as the Red Bull King of the Air reached its climax in Dubai.

While Deleau underlined his status as the extreme sport's top professional rider, Kerhoeven clinched the men's amateur freestyle title to earn a trip to Hawaii for the final of the Red Bull King of the Air series in October.

Another UAE-based rider, Venetia Maunsell, won the ladies amateur freestyle crown as the three-day event drew to its conclusion at Le Meridien Mina Seyahi Beach Resort and Marina.

Even though light winds restricted the final day action, the week's activities in Dubai have ensured that kitesurfing in the Gulf is on course for another rise in popularity.

The event showcased the skills which have taken Deleau to the world title and gave Arab nationals and other Gulf-based enthusiasts the perfect opportunity to study and learn from the master.

UAE entries

UAE's Shaikh Ahmed Hamdan Al Nahyan, Abdullah Al Muhairy and Ali Al Mahar, and Kuwait's Ahmed Al Sabah, were among a 32-competitor lineup, sharing the stage with Deleau and a cluster of other kitesurfers.

And while Deleau, as anticipated, took the mens' professional freestyle title to underline his status as the reigning Kiteboard Pro World Tour champion, the Red Bull King of the Air provided fresh impetus to the continued growth of the exciting extreme water sport in the Gulf

Other competitors representing Poland, South Africa, Britain, New Zealand, Holland, Germany, and Austria, as well as the UAE, Kuwait, and Qatar, underlined the international flavour of the event which was organised by Dubai International Marine Club (Dimc) in association with the UAE Marina Sports Federation.

With winds picking up in the late afternoon, the event
